#### **Attendance**

204 children have had their 100% Attendance Badge Awarded for Spring Term 2. Every child will have the chance to earn their Summer 2 badge after half term. We continue to search for our Attendance Ambassadors who will be presented with trophies for 100% Attendance at the end of the year. There are currently 30 children on track to achieve this, compared to 8 children who received this honour last year.



Our whole school attendance is currently 94.02%, ABOVE the National average of 93%, which is absolutely amazing!!!!

Congratulations to 2A, who have the highest attendance this half term, yet again, with 96.53%, closely followed by 6T with 96.42%, and RBH with 96.42%

#### South Staffs Water visits Year 3 and 5 15th March

Year 3 had a great morning with Emily Eden from South Staffs Water.

The children had to make a water cycle in a bag. It works by taping the bag to the window, the water will heat up (evaporation), then condense on the top of the bag (condensation) and then fall bag into the water (precipitation). The one they have made for class is already working.


Then, they looked at how South Staffs clean our water and did a filtration experiment. They had 4 items: cotton pad, one big stone, some smaller pebbles and sand. The children had to decide which was the best way to put the items into the top of the bottle. They then added muddy water and watched to see what happened to the muddy water as it filtered through the items. All the bottles revealed a murky water. It was clearer than then initial water we put in! Amazing!






Year 5 also enjoyed taking part in a 'water workshop' with Emily from South Staffs Water. During the one hour session, the children learned about rivers around the world and located them on a world map. They were introduced to some of the key terminology linked to the topic and learned why rivers are so important. The children created and labelled a picture of a river basin and learned about how we can protect rivers. They were very surprised to find out that the average person uses around 150 litres of water a day, and that a shower uses 12 litres of water per minute!






#### Design a RHPS Flag Competition

#### Junior PCSO Graduation

This half term we have celebrated the success of another group of Year 5 Junior PCSOs who have recently, proudly graduated from the scheme. The Junior PCSO scheme is an initiative ran by West Midlands Police with local Primary Schools that aims to increase the confidence and self-esteem of children, while promoting positive police engagement in order to encourage children to feel confident to approach their local policing teams with community information and concerns, or for help and support.

Our new Junior PCSO graduates completed a six week programme which included learning about the phonetic alphabet, the role of both Police Officers and PCSOs, how to be a responsible citizen, road safety, fire safety and first aid through Junior Paramedic Training. They also completed community work, which included litter picking. Our new Junior PCSOs showed super commitment to their learning and to their community throughout and even learnt the Junior PCSO pledge which they shared with the whole school during their graduation assembly. Well done to Lexi, Amelia, Emily, Gracey, Evie, Arina, Pamela, Hooria and Ashaya – we are very proud of you all! #### Online Safety

It has come to our attention that there has been a concerning rise in the inappropriate use of WhatsApp among some of our children, particularly in the creation of groups and the exchange of unkind comments. This behaviour has caused distress and disrupted the learning within school on several occasions. We kindly request that if your child possesses a mobile phone, you regularly monitor its usage if you are not already doing so. It is important to remind everyone that the age limit for WhatsApp is 13 years old. To reinforce online safety practices, we conduct monthly assemblies addressing this crucial topic. Your support in this matter is greatly appreciated so that we can help to keep everyone safe.



#### Year 5 Coding

On Tuesday 21st May the children in Year 5 took part in an online 'STEM in Space' coding session, which was led by members from the STEM community. They learned about how astronauts keep fit in space, and then worked in pairs to code their micro:bits to create an exercise program for astronauts. The children also learned how to add sound and create their own LED pictures. They were encouraged to identify any errors in their algorithms and use computational thinking to debug their work. The children have made great progress with their coding skills this half term and this was a lovely way to end the unit.

## Reception visit to Little Owl Farm Park

Reception had a fabulous day at Little Owl Farm Park on the 1st May. They got to pet day old chicks, a baby goat (kid), a bearded dragon, a rabbit and a guinea pig. They even got to feed some lambs a bottle of milk! They were then able to explore in the play barn, which was lots of fun (but the grown-ups said the yellow slide was too fast for them.) After watching a sheep race and petting a very friendly deer, they all settled back on the coach for our return to school. They arrived back to school with some very tired children (and grown-ups) after a full, fun-packed day!
